		<b>Managing Online Information</b>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• I can analyse information to make a judgement about probable accuracy and I understand why it is important to make my own decisions regarding content and that my decisions are respected by others.</li> <li>• I can describe how to search for information within a wide group of technologies and make a judgement about the probable accuracy (e.g. social media, image sites, video sites).</li> <li>• I can describe some of the methods used to encourage people to buy things online (e.g. advertising offers; in-app purchases, pop-ups) and can recognise some of these when they appear online.</li> <li>• I can explain why lots of people sharing the same opinions or beliefs online do not make those opinions or beliefs true.</li> <li>• I can explain that technology can be designed to act like or impersonate living things (e.g. bots) and describe what the benefits and the risks might be.</li> <li>• I can explain what is meant by fake news e.g. why some people will create stories or alter photographs and put them online to pretend something is true when it isn't.</li> </ul>

		<b>Copyright and Ownership</b>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• When searching on the internet for content to use, I can explain why I need to consider who owns it and whether I have the right to reuse it.</li> <li>• I can give some simple examples of content which I must not use without permission from the owner, e.g. videos, music, images.</li> </ul>
<b>British Values, Prevent and Pupil Voice</b>	<p>At Sycamore Academy we use an online platform called Votes for Schools to deliver our SMSC (including British Values), Prevent and Pupil voice. It also supports our PSHE and Citizenship Curriculum.</p> <p>Each weekly topic has an attached curriculum map which clearly evidences which criteria are being met.</p> <p>Examples of the types of topics covered every year:</p> <p>Can sharing stories prevent extremism?  Will increased awareness help end modern slavery?  Can music teach us about black history?  Is gaming good for you?  Would the suffragettes be happy with today's Parliament?</p>
